15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

BNBCS offers programs such as interdisciplinary Science, Human Science, Clinical Psychology, Biodiversity, Wildlife Conservation and Management. The college offeres Certificate courses in management, law, cybersecurity, and public administration, IPR for beginners, calligraphy, forensic science. Aligned with the National Education Policy (NEP), we provide skill-oriented courses like Soft Skills and Personality Development-II, Social Science, Defence Science, Distance and Lifelong Learning Education (DLLE), Yoga for Total Health, cultural activities, physical education, and studies on The Ancient Indian Social Structure (IKS) foster holistic student The curriculum for elective, vocational, Indian Knowledge System (IKS), Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC), cocurricular activities and generic subjects is thoughtfully designed to be dynamic, multifaceted, and future-focused. At level 6, module on Research Methodology and OJT/ internship were made compulsory. The college conducted many mutidisciplinary activities. Following are the few highlights of those. 5-day workshop conducted on the " Systematic Enquiry of Research" conducted from 2 August to 7 August 2023 where literature review, resources of research, project writing, poster and PPT preparation and presentation, writing bibliography topics were covered. Workshop on National Conference FUTECH2024 was organized by Department of IT-CS on Saturday, January 06, 2024. Department of Biotechnology and Microbiology, conducted a Mathematics bridge course during February-March 2024 for those students who had not taken the subject of mathematics in their junior college. 'Legal Protection and Improvement of the

Environment: Challenges and the Way Forward'- conference. Sankhya Club and Anubandh Alumni Association "Career Opportunities in Government Sectors" conducted on 27/01/2024 by Mr. Vedprakash Singh, Statistical Investigator, Grade -2 officer DCO, Maharashtra under Ministry of Home affairs has given thoughtful insights about the Career Opportunities in Government Sectors and talked scope in the industries. Guidance session on "Career in Pharma Sales and Marketing" by Ms. Pooja Chavla, Managing Director, Apios Life Sciences Pvt. Ltd., organized by department of chemistry

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

College has registered on the National Academic Repository portal successfully. The team including IT and Admin experts studied the process of uploading the Academic results data of students under Autonomy. As per the guidelines of the Department of Higher and Technical Education, the team started working on the ABC-ID data uploading. Mark sheet template has been finalized and approved for uploading of students ABC data on the NAD portal.

17.Skill development:

Under the National Education Policy (NEP), skill enhancement courses are designed to provide a holistic and multidisciplinary education, integrating theoretical knowledge with practical application. Courses such as Horticulture, Gardening, and Floriculture foster environmental consciousness and creativity. Fish Dishes cultivates culinary expertise, while Laboratory Techniques, Physics Measuring Skills, and Basic English enhance scientific and linguistic proficiency. Introduction to Instrumental Techniques and OPAMP, Logic Gates, and Applications offer advanced technological training. Analytical acumen is sharpened through Applications of Differentiability and Infinite Series and Polynomials. Introduction to Programming develops computational thinking, and Advanced Spreadsheet Tools refines data management skills. Additionally, Bird Identification promotes ecological awareness. Bridging the gap between academia, industry, and societal demands, initiatives such as department festivals, industrial and educational visits, excursions, field projects, internships, and research opportunities further enhance learners' competencies and prepare them for realworld challenges.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

For the effective implementation of NEP 2020 from the academic year 2023-2024, several steps were taken by the Principal of the college to make the syllabus more enriching and appealing regarding the

ancient Indian knowledge. The teachers from various faculty attended workshop and seminars regarding the NEP. The NEP syllabus for Indian Knowledge System were made specific for various subjects accordingly. The Indian Knowledge System has incorporated topics from ancient traditional practices which the world admires and have appreciated. The Indian Knowledge System has prepared students to understand the ancient basic concepts related to each specific subject.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

BNBCS has implemented NEP for the first year of BSc and MSc programmes. Based on the Vision and Mission of the institute, programme outcomes are framed. Syllabi are framed for courses with specific course outcomes which were approved by the BoS, academic council and governing body. These programme and course outcomes are communicated with the stakeholders through college websites, induction lectures and parent-teacher meetings. Teaching learning pedagogies adopted were aligned to attain the POs and COs. Attainment of course outcomes are evaluated by direct and indirect methods. Direct methods include internal assessment, practical and theory examinations. The level of attainment is reflected in the grade card on the basis of course credit. Internal assessment is based on class tests, assignments, model making, projects, field visits. Overall CGPI is used to measure the attainment of Programme outcomes. In the academic year 2023-24, IQAC has initiated the process of modification of course outcomes according to Bloom's taxonomy and has planned to measure the POs and COs using a systematic and data-driven approach. Indirect methods include mentormentee interaction, feedback from stakeholders, field visit feedback, internships, industrial training outcomes, seminar, group discussions, project evaluation, laboratory assessment, student portfolios and participation in outcome based co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

20.Distance education/online education:

Since 1999 onwards, the college is offering BLISC, MLISC, and Diploma in Journalism courses in Marathi, all affiliated to Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU), Nashik. Expanding its academic scope from 2019, BCA and MCA programs were introduced. In the academic year 2023-2024, a total of 89 students were pursuing various courses at the college. Additionally, since 2010, the college has been providing IT courses through Mumbai University's Institute of Distance and Open Learning (IDOL), ensuring flexible learning opportunities for students.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 - Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs which are reflected in Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the various Programmes offered by the Institution.

College developed outcome-based curricula of various basic and applied science subjects by incorporating educational content that is relevant, effective and aligning to specific requirements of NEP 2020. These curricula involved POs, PSOs and COs which cover main objective of addressing regional, national and global developmental needs. In year 2023-24, the syllabi of core subjects of SYBSc level were revised by adding topics that induce aptitude for science, critical thinking and practical skills which students can apply in real-world situations. Under NEP, newly implemented courses of FYBSc such as Open Elective (soft skills and personality development),

Ability Enhancement course (Basic and Scientific English, Communication skills), Indian Knowledge system (Social Structure, Yoga, Ayurveda) broadened the horizon of UG students and equipped them with diverse set of skills. Certain courses based on physical education, cultural activities, community services are equally promoting social responsibility and active citizenship. In PG level, MSc Part II syllabi were upgraded by adding research projects in both semesters while NEP based MSc Part I implemented topics covered Research Methodology, On-job training/Field Project/Internship which address local-global challenges, foster innovation and technology development. Apart from these, formation of active MOUs and Industry tie-ups were established for building necessary human resource.

inclusion of scientific and socially relevant topics led to deeper understanding about concepts which in turn develop responsible citizens and future leaders. Almost all UG-PG science programs partly integrate environmental problems, waste management and greenfuel initiatives but two dedicated MSc Programs in Environmental Science and Biodiversity Wildlife Conservation & Management encompass diverse facets of environmental issues-legislation, conservation strategies and sustainable practices. Similarly BSc Human Science and MSc Clinical Psychology involve numerous aspects of human life such asgender sensitization, human psychology and social-ethical-legal conduct. In NEP-FYBSc syllabi mandatory courses of Open Elective extensively covers professional ethics, Indian Knowledge System includes Human values and Community Engagement Courses of NSS/NCC/DLLE orient students for promoting social equality and eco-friendly practices. In NEP-MSc syllabi, research ethics learnt as well as implemented through scientific writings. Additionally motivational lectures, workshops, competition, vaccination drive, Blood donation camp, beach cleaning, e-waste and utility articles collection drives foster integrated approach to learning, bridging the gap between science and other studies like social studies, ethics and economics.

Parents-teacher meetings are conducted to make the parents aware about student's progress in the academics and overall.

There is another group of students who showcase zeal in the subject. Energy and enthusiasm of these students are skilfully channelized by the teachers to create new ideas. These students are encouraged to participate in Avishkar conducted by the University. Subject knowledge of them is boosted by their active participation in seminars, workshops, research projects/conventions, extension programs, photography activity.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

In BNBCS, teachers are striving to enhance the confidence and learning skills of students by crossing the boundaries of regular teaching methods.

Participative learning method is opted by the teachers to involve students to actively comment, talk, express their opinion on given

topics. For such learning process, teachers organize activities such as seminars, guest lectures, alumni talk. Live streaming of Aditya L1 and Chandrayan followed by discussion is one of the examples. Visits to different industries, ecosystems, market places etc. make students to understand the application of the subject.

Experiential learning upgrades insightful thinking process of the students. For such kind of vibrant study pattern, teachers are running activities like hands-on training in molecular biology, animal handling, Physics Paradoxia carnival, Chemistry Chemtech etc. Teachers are igniting the spark of research in the students. For such process students are motivated to present their work in seminars, conferences, projects, Avishkar-research convention.

Boosting of critical thinking abilities and strengthening of mind were also tackled with the help of mind games. Quiz, games, model making, crossword competition, hacks for paper solving in regular and competitive exams are problem solving teaching activities conducted which enabled students to get innovative solution to the problems.

The institute provides Ph.D. programs through its five well established research departments in Botany, Chemistry, Zoology, Physics, and Environmental Science which are supervised by a team of eight research guides, fostering a vibrant academic environment for advanced studies and innovative research. Undergraduate and postgraduate students are encouraged to undertake mini research projects in all the departments under faculty mentorship and actively participate in various research conventions.

Nineteen projects presented at the zonal round of 18th Inter-

Collegiate Avishkar Research Convention, three were selected for the final round. Dr. Jayashree Pawar received national level free registration as part of the SSR (Scientific Social Responsibility) initiative under the SERB grant from Dr. Jyoti Kode, ACTREC, to attend a workshop on humanized mice during the 3rd Global Cancer Consortium conference.

The institution is located in bustling city of Thane, spanning 13.5 acres, shared with four sister institutes, creating a vibrant learning environment.  - Being an educational institute, the waste generation at BNBCS, mainly comprises of office stationary waste, daily generated bio-waste and also waste generated in laboratories.
 - Paper wastes collected from the office, library and individual departments is properly segregated, reused wherever possible and unwanted stuff is subjected to disposal by office authorities. The old newspapers are used by laboratories to pack sterile glassware. The institution advocates 'Less paper' use.
 - The laboratory staff segregates the glass waste and metalsharps, store it in secured area and then dispose them separately.
