Preamble

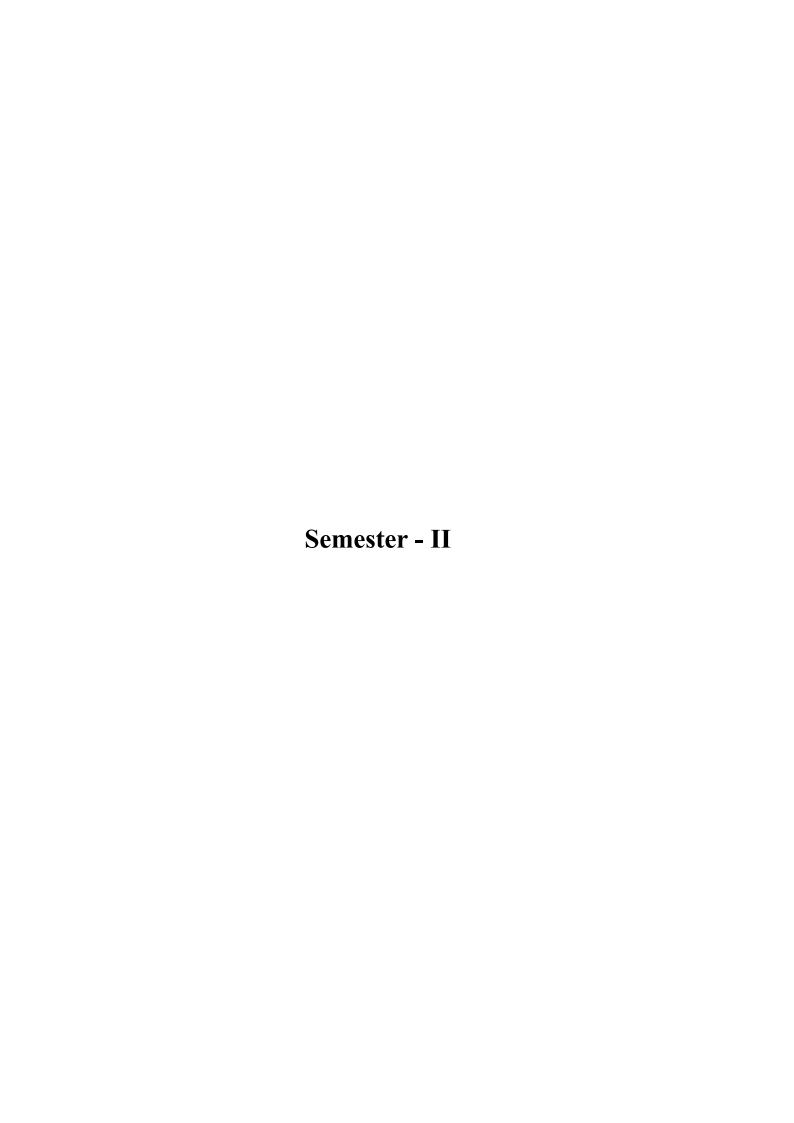
